# Investing in a Liberal Arts and Sciences Education

More than 3.7 million students have chosen a private liberal arts and sciences education. Nearly 80 percent of these students were able to earn their degrees in four years or less, compared to just less than 50 percent at four-year state institutions.<sup>1</sup>

Students with a liberal arts and sciences education seek to challenge, to explore, to uncover. Through broadened perspectives you'll develop skills which are essential to every career choice, to formulating where you fit and what you'll do in the world.

## How do we measure up?

For 2010, we have our own success numbers:

- 36.4 percent of students who co-oped were hired by their co-op employers following graduation.
- Of all 2010 survey respondents, 83.5 percent of our bachelor's degree recipients have secured employment.
- Of all 2010 survey respondents, 79.6 percent of graduate degree recipients have secured employment.

Specifically cited were written and oral communication, critical thinking and analytical reasoning, complex problem solving, ethical decision making, and applied knowledge in real-world settings.<sup>2</sup>

# Mount Scholarships

The Mount offers several levels of academic scholarships and awards to incoming students in recognition of academic achievement. They do not require a separate application and are awarded on a rolling basis, typically beginning in November. Eligible students will receive an offer for one academic scholarship or award.

These scholarship and awards are renewable if the student is full time and maintaining a 3.0 college GPA. Part-time students and students with previous bachelor's degrees are not eligible. High school GPA is based on a 4.0 scale; other grading scales will be converted to a 4.0.

## Applying for Need-based Financial Assistance

- 1 Complete the admission application and receive notification of acceptance.
- 2 Visit the resources section at [www.msj.edu/financial-aid](http://www.msj.edu/financial-aid) to estimate your financial aid and use our online tool for finding a Mount scholarship.
- 3 Complete and submit the FAFSA before March 1 for the maximum amount of assistance. The FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) factors in income, assets, family size, number of children in college, and other expenses when determining the family contribution figure. After your FAFSA has been processed you'll receive a Student Aid Report (SAR), and the Mount will then develop an individualized financial aid package for you. Our federal code is 003033.
- 4 Fill all forms out carefully and keep copies for your records. Keep Federal Income Tax returns as they may be needed to verify information on the FAFSA.
- 5 Reapply every year. Financial aid is not automatically renewed. Each year you must file a FAFSA or Renewal FAFSA to be considered for need-based financial aid. Check renewal requirements on all scholarships.
- 6 Special Circumstances – If you or your family's financial circumstances change after our initial evaluation or after you submit your FAFSA, contact our office regarding possible adjustments. Visit [www.msj.edu/financial-aid](http://www.msj.edu/financial-aid) for a special circumstances form.

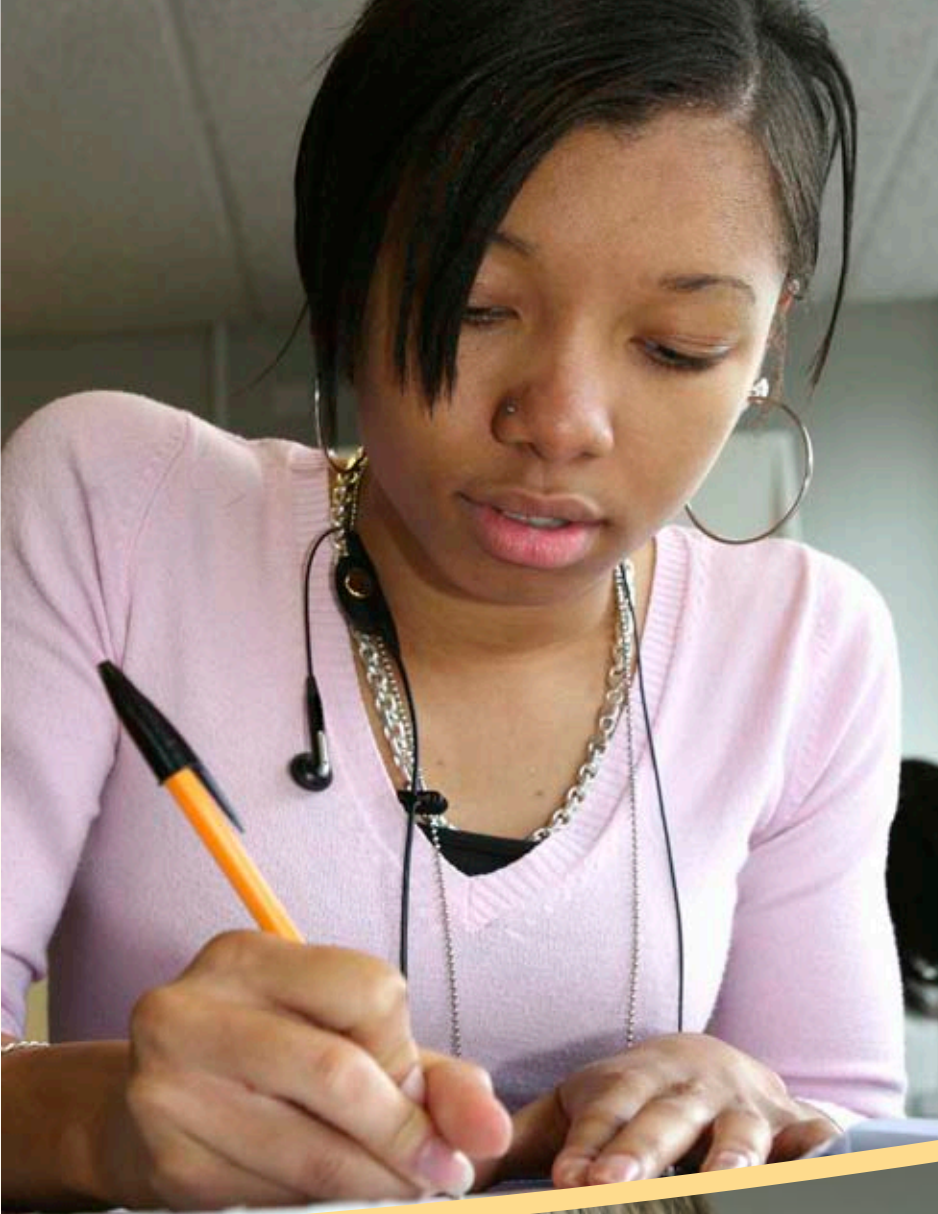

## Payment Options

### Financial Aid/Student Loans

Students are encouraged to apply early for financial aid in order to have a “package” by the confirmation date. Awards are made on a first-come, first-served basis as long as funds are available.

Students who plan to be enrolled at least half time, looking for a long-term financing vehicle might want to consider student loans, which offer more favorable terms than most credit programs available to students.

### Interest-Free Monthly Payment Plan

Tuition Management Systems (TMS) Interest-Free Monthly Payment Plan offers students a monthly payment plan option that allows students/parents to spread their education expenses over 8-10 manageable monthly payments. Instead of a semester lump-sum payment, the plan allows students to budget all or part of their education expense into manageable monthly installments.

## Service Fees

Service fees are added to unpaid student accounts at a monthly rate of 1½ percent. Payments must be received by the 20th of the month to avoid service fees.

## Refunds

Student account refunds are processed automatically once a credit balance is generated on a student’s account and all online charges are posted for a term. Students may make a refund preference by accessing their Web registration screen. Refunds will be processed within 14 days of the credit being generated on the account.

## Case Studies

Evaluating the cost of your college education should include determining time-to-degree, comparing all of your financial aid options with your out-of-pocket expenses, and considering the variety of tax credits that are available. The total cost of your education includes tuition, room and board, books, fees, transportation, and personal expenses.

Families are unique and so are their financial aid needs. These four case studies portray different scenarios of financial need and total aid packages.

### Case Study: Julie

Julie lives close to the Mount and has decided she would like to live at home. She is from a family of four whose parents have a combined income of \$60,000 and very little in savings.

# Terms and Tips

## Terms

### Expected Family Contribution (EFC)

The combination of the parent contribution and the student contribution toward college expenses calculated from the information supplied on the FAFSA.

### FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid)

This is a standardized form used to determine your eligibility for need-based financial aid by collecting data about your family's income and monetary assets. The EFC calculated from this data is used to determine your financial need, Pell Grant eligibility, and if you're an Ohio resident, eligibility for the Ohio College Opportunity Grant.

### Financial need

The difference between the cost of a Mount education and the amount your family can contribute as measured by your EFC.

### Grant

An award based on financial need that does not have to be repaid.

### Loan

A sum of money lent at a specific rate of interest for a specific timeframe.

### Package

Total combination of scholarships, grants, loans, and employment offered to students to meet financial need.

### Scholarship

An award typically based on ability that does not have to be repaid.

### Student Aid Report (SAR)

The processed results of the FAFSA form sent to the student. Most students receive an eSAR (electronic SAR) at the e-mail address they supplied on the FAFSA.

### Merit-based Scholarships

These are based on grade-point average, and, if applicable, SAT/ACT scores, as well as ability in such areas as music or art.

### Need-based Awards

These are based on the cost to attend the Mount minus the EFC received from the FAFSA.

### Federal Direct Loan

A federal loan consisting of subsidized and/or unsubsidized funds.

- *Subsidized Loan* – The U.S. Department of Education will pay the interest on this loan for as long as you're enrolled in school at least half time, and during a six-month grace period after you leave school.
- *Unsubsidized Loan* – Unsubsidized means you are responsible for paying interest that accrues while you're in college.

## Tips

### Plan Ahead

Become familiar with procedures, priority dates and deadlines.

### File the FAFSA

This government form is available via the Internet at [www.fafsa.gov](http://www.fafsa.gov). Be sure to list the College of Mount St. Joseph and its six-digit code, 003033. We will be able to access your information electronically as soon as it is processed. The FAFSA is available online January 1.

### Apply Early

The best time to file the FAFSA for maximum, timely consideration is between January 1 and March 1. You do not necessarily need to have completed your tax returns in order to file a FAFSA.

### Do Research

Be sure to research scholarships and grants, especially those that are local. Help is often available in other places, such as: Cincinnati Scholarship Foundation, high school counselors, parent teacher associations, places of employment (yours and your parents), religious affiliations, and organizations such as Junior League.

### Respond to Information Requests

Promptly reply to all requests from the Mount for additional information.

### Keep Records

Complete all forms carefully and keep copies for your records. Keep federal income tax returns as they may be needed to verify information on the FAFSA.

### Ask Questions

Contact Student Administrative Services with any questions or concerns you may have. Feel free to e-mail, call or schedule an appointment to discuss your situation.

### Special Circumstances

If you or your family's financial circumstances change after our initial evaluation or after you submit your FAFSA, contact Student Administrative Services regarding possible adjustments. Go to [www.msj.edu/financial-aid](http://www.msj.edu/financial-aid) to download a Special Circumstance Form.

### Reapply Every Year

Financial aid is not automatically renewed. Each year, you must file a FAFSA by March 1 to be considered for need-based financial aid. You should also check renewal requirements on all scholarships.

### Manage Debt Wisely

We recommend that borrowing be limited to necessary educational expenses. The Mount's Student Administrative Services team offers debt management assistance to help you plan repayment obligations.

### Tax Credits

Some tax credits carry restrictions, such as income level and whether a student attends college full time or part time. Interest paid on federal and private education loans can be deducted on your federal tax return.

# Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs)

## What is your Title IV School Code?

Our six-digit Title IV Code is: 003033.

## My dad lost his job and won't have as much income as he had in 2011. What do I do?

After you file the 2012-13 FAFSA, you will need to visit [www.msjs.edu/financial-aid](http://www.msjs.edu/financial-aid) to complete the Special Circumstance Form. It enables you to describe your situation and provide documentation.

## What are Federal Direct Loans?

Federal Direct Loans are a special type of loan made to college students. They can be subsidized or unsubsidized based on your financial need. You must have demonstrated financial need to qualify for a subsidized loan, which has the interest paid by the federal government while you are enrolled in school at least half time and during your six month grace period.

You may also be awarded an unsubsidized loan (interest accrues on this loan while you're in college). Some students are awarded both – a portion of a loan might be subsidized and the balance unsubsidized.

## What other loans are available?

Your parents may take a Federal PLUS Loan to cover your remaining balance. Sixty days after the final disbursement of the loan amount (each year's loan is considered a separate loan), parents are required to begin the repayment process unless they opt to defer payment until you finish college. Parents have 10 years to repay a PLUS loan. In addition, alternative loans are available to students to cover any remaining balance.

## How much time do I have to repay my student loans?

You have up to ten years to repay principle and interest for both of the Federal student loan programs we administer – Direct and Perkins Loans.

## Does the Mount have a payment plan?

The Mount works with Tuition Management System (TMS) to offer you an option to budget yearly tuition over eight, nine or 10 months with no interest. For more information or an application, go to [www.afford.com](http://www.afford.com) or call 1-800-356-8329.

## When does the repayment begin?

Repayment terms vary. You will have a grace period of six months after graduation before you must begin making payments on your Federal Direct Loan. With the Perkins Loan, you will have a grace period of nine months.

## We're not going to fill out the FAFSA because people have told us that we probably won't qualify for any financial aid. What do you suggest?

You should still complete the form. The FAFSA takes many things into consideration. Also, keep in mind that every student is eligible for a Federal Direct Loan.

## After I send in my FAFSA, how long will it be before I receive an award letter?

If you have been accepted to the Mount, it will take approximately two weeks to receive notification.

## If I have financial aid at the school I'm currently attending can I transfer it to the Mount?

When you add our code to your FAFSA record, the results are sent to the Mount. Once you've been admitted as a transfer student, we put together a financial aid package based on our awarding policy and available funding. You may receive some of the same types of financial aid but packages can vary.

## I play a sport. What scholarships or grants do you offer to athletes?

A student's participation in NCAA Division III athletics at the Mount cannot be considered in the assessment or awarding of financial assistance. This is prohibited by NCAA Division III rules.

## My dad makes over \$100,000 per year, but we have six kids in our family. Does our family's size impact our chances of receiving financial aid?

The needs analysis makes an adjustment to your income called the "income protection allowance" based on your family size and the number attending college. The larger your family, the higher the income protection allowance will be. It protects a portion of your family's income for living expenses.

## I filled out the FAFSA and have received my financial aid award letter. I've already been awarded my academic and other scholarships from the Mount. I still need more financial aid in order to attend. What else can I do?

Schedule an appointment with a representative from Student Administrative Services, so we can ensure you have considered local scholarships and that you have accurate figures for your estimated costs. We'll also discuss other options such as the Federal PLUS Loan, the alternative loans and the TMS payment plan.

## Will the amount of need-based financial aid I've been awarded decrease as a result of receiving an academic scholarship from the Mount?

Typically we know about academic scholarships before we package need-based aid. We adjust scholarship amounts when we receive new ACT and/or SAT scores, when transcripts come in with recalculated grade point averages, or when final grades are received from previous college work. Some scholarships are awarded after the need-based process. These increases in scholarship amounts can result in a reduction in need-based funding.

## What if I receive a scholarship from an organization other than the Mount?

We need to take a look at your need-based financial aid package to see if any adjustments are necessary. Changes to the self-help aid such as student loans or work study are made before we adjust any grant or scholarship funding.

## What if I'm receiving assistance from my employer or from a scholarship organization? Do I need to pay this amount up front?

If you provide Student Administrative Services with documentation of the assistance the third party has agreed to pay by the payment confirmation due date, we will not expect you to pay it up front. We will bill outside parties as long as we receive original authorization from the provider. You will continue to receive monthly statements for this amount until it is paid in full.
